Feedback Obtained

The institution from time to time obtains feedback from stakeholders such as students, parents, academicians and alumni based on criteria such as discipline of students, curriculum, facilities available in the department and college, quality of teaching, extracurricular activities, placement and teachers and student relation. Soon after the feedback is obtained, the departmental meeting is called for and the rudiments to improvise on the standards are being discussed amongst the faculty members are systematically analysed. Periodic parentteachers meet is orchestrated by the class teachers to discuss about the attendance and academic position of the students. Feedbacks that are collected from the parents every semesters are carefully brought for examination in the meet hosted in the department and after analysing them, several new measures are taken to uphold the standard of the student and the institution alike. Daily attendance for the class hours is sent to the parents in the form of SMS. More number of events related to Soft Skill development are conducted through the Departmental Association. Availability of Lab reagents is made easy in all laboratories with a new system for minimal usage. More number of Interdisciplinary and socially relevant projects are given to UG and PG students to enrich the collaborative research. Separate laboratories are allotted for UG and PG students, indicating variation and degree of content to suit the expectation and need of students. The institution also works its way to create entrepreneurship skills among students. We train students in organic farming and PCR trouble shooting, advanced computer languages, network systems, language lab to equip prowess in communication skills and thereby providing various lab techniques to develop their entrepreneurship skills. Entrepreneurship cell is formed exclusively to develop the Entrepreneurial skills of the students. The feedback obtained as mentioned above is consolidated and presented in the Board of Studies that is held annually. The feedback is contemplated upon and the expertise of the board of studies members analyse the contemporary relevance and feasibility of the implementation of the feedback. Syllabus in alignment with professional courses is framed and new programme is introduced based on the feedback from the parents and alumni. More quantitative papers in the first two years of the UG Programme are revised based on the feedback from the Students. Syllabus gets revised and gets updated consistently according to the needs of the industry. Students are motivated to do online courses. The suggestions of the parents, alumni, Board of Studies members subject experts and teachers are brainstormed and based on the agreement arrived at the feedback is either incorporated or alternative strategies are devised and included in the curriculum. Feedbacks from students about the teachers are also collected every semester to improvise the standard of the teacher's teaching dexterity. Thus improvement and improvisations are made as a response to the valuable feedbacks to bring about an allinclusive growth in students and for the development of the institution.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Bishop Heber College provides an adept mentoring system for each and every student of the College. Each student is allotted and assigned to a faculty mentor for individual guidance, career progression and growth even at the beginning of their programme. Mentors are assigned to monitor and guide students all through the three years for Under Graduates and two years for post Graduates. Mentors meet their students and guide them periodically regarding their studies and extracurricular activities. The mentor analyses the strength and weakness of the students and guides them in the needed path. Every faculty member stretches his/her service as a mentor and builds a rapport with the student mentee, encouraging him or her to ask questions, attempting to clarify doubts and facilitate counselling on different issues. The academically sound and motivated students are identified and given guidance according to their ambition. Similarly slow learners are identified and given sufficient motivation towards the improvisation of their academic prowess. Students are accordingly encouraged by the mentors to participate in sports, NSS, NCC, other Part V clubs (Service Clubs), cultural and other fine arts events. They also provide advice relating to selection of major, career guidance and personal problems. Mentors even converse with their fellow colleagues for the sake of his/her ward and help mentees at the time of difficulty and promote at the time of opportunity to support them develop further in their areas of interest. The mentors act as guides to the students during their summer and final projects. The mentors also act as a guardian for the mentees and have a better understanding of his/her financial background as well. When scholarship is given from college and government, mentors once again makes sure that the needy and deserving mentee applies for it and gets the benefits. The mentoring system enhances the students' confidence and challenges them by setting higher goals, moulding them in taking risks and eventually guiding them to achieve higher levels. Individual appreciation and backing, psychosocial support at the time of need, routine advice on balancing of academic and professional tasks are a few significant credentials validated by the mentors in Bishop Heber College. Mentors act as role models and facilitate leadership by developing the interpersonal skills and helping students thrive in competitive environments. From time to time, the Head of the Department reviews the proper implementation of the mentoring system. Mentors even coordinate with the parents regarding the progress of the students, and strike a cordial relation with the mentee's parents as well. The mentors thus lay the groundwork for the students to reach better heights in their professional lives, thereby contributing to durable individual and professional relationship.

DST FIST and Ministry of Food Processing Industries (MOFPI) New Delhi to augment the facilities of the Science Departments and the common instrumentation centre. The centre is equipped with sophisticated Analytical equipment's that facilitates students and researchers of Bishop Heber College, other academic institutions and industries. The Institution maintains laboratory equipment by standardisation and maintenance done by the technicians of related owner enterprises. The High Quality Modular Lab Furniture and Equipment used for experiments are cleaned and maintained by the concerned departments and record of maintenance is maintained by lab technicians and supervised by HODs of the concerned departments. Moreover there is systematic disposal of waste of all types such as biodegradable chemical/chemical and e-waste. The College Library ensures that no document or book or thesis or journal is lost or mutilated. Stacking, shelf arrangement, cleaning, shelving, stock verification and weeding of unwanted material are a few among the regular routines to safeguard the resources in the library. The library also propels the utilization of resources like INFLIBNET NList, Consortium for Educational Communication (CEC) and National Digital Library of India (NDL). To ensure return of books, 'no dues' from the library is mandatory for students before appearing in exam. Along with this, a proper account of visitors (students and staff) on daily basis is maintained. The Institution invests periodically towards the indoor and outdoor athletic maintenance. Regarding the maintenance of indoor badminton, shuttle court, table tennis court and gym in the college, sports in charge and coaches are consulted. In their guidance accommodations are arranged. Preventive maintenance program for ground surfaces are systematically carried out. Some of this maintenance are required for aesthetics but mostly it is completed to promote player and spectator safety. Funds are used to maintain computers in the centralized computer laboratories of our college. Computer maintenance through AMC is done regularly and it involves the installation, upkeep, repair and security of computer equipment and networks. Nonrepairable systems are disposed of. The institution takes much care of the smart class rooms and provides maintenance whenever there is a demand in infrastructure.
