15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The college provides a diverse range of courses in both undergraduate and postgraduate programs, embracing both multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approaches. Students have the opportunity to explore Non-Major Elective Courses (NMEC) and Skill-Based Elective Courses (SBEC), allowing them to enroll in courses offered by other departments within the college. These SBEC courses are designed to foster inter-disciplinary learning. Additionally, the college offers specialized interdisciplinary programs such as Master of Social Work, Bachelor of Science in Environmental Sciences, Master of Environmental Sciences, M.Sc. Data Science, and M.Sc. Actuarial Sciences. These programs span multiple disciplines, including Psychology, Sociology, Statistics, Biology, Chemistry, Zoology, Ecology, and Botany. Encouraging interdisciplinary projects is also a significant aspect of the college's approach to education.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

During the Academic Year 2004-2005, the College implemented the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS). To encourage students' continuous learning and skill development, the college motivates them to take up Online Courses available from platforms such as SWAYAM, NPTEL, and MOOC. Upon successful completion of these Online Courses, students earn extra credits. Moreover, the college rewards students who undertake Summer/Winter Projects and internships during their study period by granting them additional credits. To facilitate seamless credit transfer as per the National Education Policy of 2020, the College registered with the National Academic Repository (NAD) and is now part of the Academic Bank of Credits.

17.Skill development:

The college prioritizes skill-based learning and offers a wide array of courses across all departments aimed at enhancing subject-based knowledge and employability skills among students. To ensure that students are well-equipped for the demands of the job market, the college regularly updates its curriculum. The Deanery of Training and Placement plays a crucial role in fostering appropriate skill acquisition by organizing various programs focused on employability, including workshops on Communication Skills, Resume Building, and Interpersonal Skills.

Additionally, a dedicated course on Life Skills has been integrated into the curriculum for Undergraduate Students during their final year of study. This course covers essential areas such as Communication and Numeracy Skills, imparting crucial abilities that will be valuable both in their professional careers and personal lives. The college is committed to empowering students with a comprehensive skill set that will serve them well in their future endeavors.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Undergraduates are required to study either Tamil or Hindi or Sanskrit as their Part I language for a minimum of two to four semesters. To integrate cultural and Indian knowledge systems into their respective disciplines, various departments like Tamil, English, Economics, Hindi, History, and Social Work offer specialized courses.

Both undergraduate and postgraduate students are also enrolled in a comprehensive course on Value and Life Oriented (VLO) Education. This course emphasizes the importance of upholding social and cultural values within Indian society.

To enrich their understanding of Indian literature, students have access to a wide selection of books in English and Translation, providing valuable resources to enhance their literary exploration. The college is dedicated to nurturing a holistic educational experience that celebrates Indian culture and heritage across various academic disciplines. The College's Fine Arts Association instills knowledge and skills on Folklore, Folkdance and other forms of traditational form of Dance, Song and Drama.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The vision and mission of each program are aligned with the Program Outcomes (POs) established since 2019. These POs, along with Program

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Specific Outcomes (PSOs), Course Outcomes (COs), and Specific Learning Outcomes (SLOs), have been meticulously formulated and approved by the College's Academic Council, following thoughtful deliberations by the Boards of Studies.

To ensure alignment with the institution's vision, a 3-point scale is used to map the outcomes, and the alignment of POs to COs is also considered. Course Coordinators play a crucial role in this process by determining the K levels of the SLOs and COs and preparing question paper blueprints before the start of each course.

For effective assessment, the percentage of Higher Order Thinking Skills (HOTS) and Lower Order Thinking Skills (LOTS) questions proposed by course coordinators is presented to and endorsed by the concerned Boards of Studies and the Academic Body, which comprises experts from both within and outside the college, along with the Chief Examination Officer (COE).

The college displays the outcome-based syllabi on its website and ensures that students receive a copy from their respective course teachers. To assess students' attainment, the revised Bloom's Taxonomy is followed, guiding the setting of questions and devising appropriate assessment methods.

Teachers have the autonomy to design assignments, seminars, and other innovative components for Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA). For contemporary and skill-based courses, creative means of assessment are employed to foster a more engaging and effective learning experience for students. The college is committed to maintaining high standards of education, encouraging critical thinking and skill development among its students through a well-structured and outcome-driven approach.

20.Distance education/online education:

The college acknowledges the significance of distance education and online learning in fostering life-long learning opportunities. As a result, it is actively exploring the possibility of offering courses and programs through these modes of education. To enhance students' academic experience, a policy decision was made for each department to offer at least one Value-Added course per semester, regardless of the students' study streams. During the academic year 2020-2021, both Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and End-of-Semester Examinations were conducted exclusively online. To facilitate this process, the college introduced the Heber Online Xam Portal, which allowed for automated question paper distribution and submission of

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answer scripts. Developed by Data Science students and faculty experts in April 2020, the HeberOX software ensured secure online exams with OTP verification, revealing the identity of the teacher and examination details just five minutes before the commencement of exams. This ensured a foolproof system for question paper distribution by the Chief Examination Officer (COE). The college recognizes the indispensable role of ICT-enabled tools in the teaching-learning process. Faculty members are well-equipped with the necessary skills through workshops and Faculty Development Programs (FDP) on EContent development and ICT tools, conducted by the Deanery of Academics and IQAC. Both teachers and students actively pursue courses through MOOC and online platforms like SWAYAM and NPTEL, with most students having completed at least one online certificate course. Professors also contribute to the digital learning ecosystem by creating their own E-Content based on the prescribed syllabus and sharing their expertise through personal blogs. Online classes are conducted using platforms like G-meet or Zoom, allowing for effective interaction between teachers and learners. Teachers leverage a variety of online tools like Mentimeter, Socrative, Near-pod, Kahoot, Quizlet, WebQuest, and ChemDraw to facilitate engaging and interactive learning experiences. The college ensures that all classrooms have appropriate infrastructure to support ICT-enabled tools and blended learning. Online examinations are conducted seamlessly through HeberOx, and the college management efficiently maintains attendance, mark registers, and online admissions through software generated by the IT Department. Additionally, the college has been an Approved Study Centre for Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU) since 1985, further expanding the opportunities for distance education. Incorporating these modern approaches and embracing technological advancements, the college is committed to providing its students with a dynamic and enriched learning environment, both in-person and online.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student-centric methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences:

The institution emphasizes a "Learning by Doing" approach, integrating it into their teaching and learning process. Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) includes seminars, quizzes, debates, group discussions, and open book tests. The Innovative Component evaluates students' higher-order thinking abilities through their innovative ideas connected to their courses. Studentcentric techniques fostering sustained learning include Participative Learning employs various methods such as group seminars, E-content creation by students, hands-on practice, computer-assisted learning, debates, and more. Experiential Learning allows students to gain practical experience through field trips, industrial visits, projects, and hands-on practice in different fields. Problem Solving Methodology incorporates activities like social surveys, brainstorming sessions, hackathons, and panel discussions, enhancing analytical, decisionmaking and synthesis skills. Project-Based Learning is implemented for final-year undergraduate and postgraduate students, encouraging them to apply principles to real-world problems, develop research competency, and foster teamwork. The institution supports advanced learners through specialized coaching for competitive exams and extra credit courses, while individualized instruction, mentor-mentee meetings, and skill-development programs aid slow learners. 2.3.2 - Teachers use ICT-enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning

The institution ensures easy access to information with 24/7 free Wi-Fi on campus. It boasts 144 ICT-enabled classrooms, each equipped with a desktop and LCD projector. Virtual lab facilities and hybrid courses enrich the learning experience. Faculty members have created 563 e-contents and a Knowledge Repository Portal. Learners benefit from various software applications in fields like programming, bioinformatics, chemistry, mathematics and visual communication. The Centre for Language Empowerment and Development (LEAD) actively trains over 4000 students annually using language software applications. The campus features a Lecture Capturing System, 12 seminar halls with video-conferencing, and 5 Smartboards with navigational software. The institution is a Local Chapter of SWAYAM-NPTEL, offering access to MOOCs. Faculty members employ interactive tools, Google Classroom, and various online platforms for teaching, especially during the pandemic. Moodle LMS enhances the teaching-learning process. Specialized computer laboratory courses are available to upskill students in different disciplines. Differently-abled students benefit from various assistive technologies like Braille Library, Screen Readers, and Voice Recording facilities. Internet access and printing equipment are provided for all students, and hands-on practice is available for computer science and related fields. The Examination process became computerized with hassle-free Online Registration and Fee payment modes. The ERP system facilitates the consolidation of Internal Marks and ensures accurate attendance records. Results are processed and published online and Examination related information is accessible through the Online Examination Portal. To maintain confidentiality, question paper setting and evaluation are done through passwordprotected CDs. Faculty members are trained to use IBOSS Software for examination management. Visually impaired students benefit from Voice Recording Facility instead of scribes. The EMS-Heber Online Exam Portal, HeberOX, was introduced during the COVID-19 pandemic, enabling smooth question paper dissemination and answer script collection with OTP verification. Examination reforms include retakes for missed exams due to various reasons, the use of objective type questions in some courses, consideration of library hours for CIA marks, and an innovative component in CIA

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for assessing creativity. The Institution is part of the National Academic Depository, facilitating credit transfer through the Academic Bank of Credits. Plagiarism checks are mandatory for PG projects using URKUND. Key aspects of the examination process include question paper setting by external experts, centralized evaluation with internal and external evaluators and a revaluation option for students within 15 days of result publication.

The Articulation Matrix analyzes students' overall scores, considering Gap Analysis and Outcome reports. Curriculum updates are based on faculty recommendations and Indirect Assessment Methods. Continuous assessment has allowed the Institution to refine the curriculum, introducing innovative programs/courses based on stakeholder needs. This ensures the institution's offerings align with learning outcomes and workforce requirements, preparing students for successful careers and fostering a lifelong love for learning.

Bishop Heber College emphasizes academic excellence through research, facilitated by the exclusive Deanery for Research and Development. Research Policies encompass promotion, ethics, plagiarism check, and consultancy. Research Committees, such as Research Advisory, Plagiarism Standing, and Research Ethics Committees, oversee scholars' activities. The college has 17 recognized Research Departments with 238 Ph.D. scholars under 127 supervisors. Research facilities include a DST-FIST funded Centralized Heber Analytical Instrumentation Facility, wellstocked library, and dedicated computer labs. Faculty and scholars are recognized annually for their research contributions. Institutional incentives and awards support research activities, resulting in substantial output. External agencies grant significant research funds, and consultancy generates revenue. The college boasts 350 publications in indexed journals, 182 articles in Scopus, and 129 in Web of Sciences, among others. It has produced 185 Ph.D. scholars, and students have authored books,

contributed to papers, and developed products and apps. The Institutional Scopus h-index is 14, demonstrating the institution's commitment to impactful research. The Research forum 'Synergy' comprising the research scholars of all Departments addresses the issues/concerns experienced by researchers. The institution's impressive publication record, Ph.D. scholars, and students' contributions demonstrate its impact in the academic world.

6.2 - Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 - The institutional Strategic/ Perspective plan has been clearly articulated and implemented

The 'Academic Audit and Star Department Evaluation' is an integral part of the Perspective Plan Deployment aimed at achieving high-quality benchmarks across various departments of the institution. Conducted annually since 2008 by the IQAC, the audit process focuses on Quality Indicators recommended by NAAC & MHRD-NIRF and department-specific milestones.

To streamline the auditing process, the IQAC has developed the Heber e-Portal Template for AQAR (HePTA), providing a scientific approach to auditing, ensuring accuracy, and efficiency. Internal Evaluators assess the departments, followed by External evaluation by Subject Experts who verify evidence and departmental presentations while maintaining confidentiality.

Scoring is based on different parameters, with a maximum score of 100 for each department. The Arts Departments' scoring ranges from Five Stars for scores of 60 and above, down to One Star for scores between 20 and 29. Similarly, Science Departments score Five Stars for 70 and above, down to One Star for scores between 30 and 39.

Recognizing the excellence, the management awards cash prizes to departments, with Five Star Departments receiving Rs. 50,000/-, Four Star Departments Rs. 30,000/-, and Three Star Departments Rs. 20,000/-.

The Academic Audit fosters healthy competition among departments, encouraging them to set higher benchmarks for holistic development.

The college places significant emphasis on maintaining financial transparency and accountability through a well-structured system of internal and external audits. The college employs a full-time Chartered Accountant and an Auditor to handle the accounts on a regular basis, and a statutory auditor conducts an annual review of all financial records. To promote transparency and responsible financial management at the department level, the college conducts an "Administrative Audit" of income and expenditure for each financial year. Each department is required to furnish details of various income and expenditure heads, supported by bills and vouchers, which are then audited by the Internal The college organized a three-day Workshop on Academic and Administrative Audit for its administrative staff, with support from UBCHEA. Moreover, to enhance transparency in financial management, the college's government accounts undergo external audits by officers from the Joint Director of Collegiate Education annually, with an additional review by the Auditor General every five years. 6.4.3 - Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

The Institution's resource mobilization policy aims to provide quality higher education to all students. It operates through two streams: Aided and Self-Financed. The Aided stream, consisting of 17 programs, receives funds from the government and utilizes student fees for running costs and overheads. In the Self-Financed stream with 37 programs, student fees are used for staff salaries, infrastructure, teaching materials, and assessments. Funds are also generated through institutional activities and endowment contributions from retired staff and alumni. The institution has received significant support from various government and international agencies, including the University Grants Commission, Department of Biotechnology, and others. Additionally, the college engages in resource-generating activities like renting out halls and guest houses, alumni contributions, sports academies' fees, institutional consultancy, and corporate training. Departments mobilize resources through donations and manage them responsibly with internal and external audits. OBE-Based Curriculum: All 51 Programs (UG & PG) align with the Institution's Vision and Mission, emphasizing Whole Person Education. The Curriculum is mapped to Bloom's Taxonomy Levels, enabling learners to understand Program Outcomes, Specific Learning Outcomes, etc. Attainment Calculations are done, and an Articulation Matrix identifies gaps. Recommendations and indirect assessment methods are compared, leading to curriculum revisions. Ongoing attainment assessment and new programs/courses are introduced based on requirements. Course Coordinators create Action Plans for each course, strengthening the Formative Assessment Loop.

Teaching Learning Assessment Enhancement: a) ICT Enabled Teaching-Learning Assessment: IQAC enhances ICT skills of teaching staff through a one-week workshop. Faculty create SLO videos as econtent, integrating ICT tools into their lesson plans. This promotes engaging learning experiences and periodic SLO attainment assessment. b) Institutional Academic Performance Indicator (API): IQAC designed a tool to assess faculty performance across various parameters like teaching competency, research output, additional responsibilities at college and department levels. A scientific scoring procedure facilitates objective interpretation and enables faculty development. These initiatives ensure a learner-centric approach and continuous improvement of teaching, learning, and assessment practices within the institution.

Through a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Joe Engineering works, the Institution receives assistance in waste management, aiming to transform into a Zero-Waste Institution within two years in the city. In recognition of their zero-waste practices, the Trichy City Corporation awarded the Institution in

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August 2022. Garden's degradable waste is vermi-composted to enrich the soil, with the compost being sold at ?15 per kilogram, generating ?59,300 in revenue from 2020 to 2022. Food waste from Hostels and Canteens is partly donated as fodder for Poultry farms, while the rest is utilized to produce Biogas. • The main waste produced at the Institution is Paper, which is recycled into folders, files, and gift articles at the Paper Recycling Unit established in 2022. • Waste bins are available in classrooms, corridors, canteens, and hostel kitchens, with green-coloured dustbins dedicated to biodegradable waste like food waste and paper. • E-waste production is minimized through careful maintenance efforts such as using quality power cables, stabilizers, and inverters, and the dysfunctional computers are used in a Computer Assembling and Troubleshooting Unit for student learning.

Student-centric techniques fostering sustained learning include Participative Learning employs various methods such as group seminars, E-content creation by students, handson practice, computer-assisted learning, debates, and more. Experiential Learning allows students to gain practical experience through field trips, industrial visits, projects, and hands-on practice in different fields. Problem Solving Methodology incorporates activities like social surveys, brainstorming sessions, hackathons, and panel discussions, enhancing analytical, decision-making and synthesis skills. Project-Based Learning is implemented for final-year

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undergraduate and postgraduate students, encouraging them to apply principles to real-world problems, develop research competency, and foster teamwork. The institution supports advanced learners through specialized coaching for competitive exams and extra credit courses, while individualized instruction, mentor-mentee meetings, and skill-development programs aid slow learners. By incorporating these effective teaching and learning methodologies, the institution creates an environment that nurtures critical thinking, practical knowledge, and problem-solving skills, preparing students to meet the demands of the job market and excel in their chosen fields.

2.3.2 - Teachers use ICT-enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning

The institution ensures easy access to information with 24/7 free Wi-Fi on campus. It boasts 144 ICT-enabled classrooms, each equipped with a desktop and LCD projector. Virtual lab facilities and hybrid courses enrich the learning experience. Faculty members have created 563 e-contents and a Knowledge Repository Portal. Learners benefit from various software applications in fields like programming, bioinformatics, chemistry, mathematics and visual communication. The Centre for Language Empowerment and Development (LEAD) actively trains over 4000 students annually using language software applications. The campus features a Lecture Capturing System, 12 seminar halls with video-conferencing, and 5 Smartboards with navigational software. The institution is a Local Chapter of SWAYAM-NPTEL, offering access to MOOCs. Faculty members employ interactive tools, Google Classroom, and various online platforms for teaching, especially during the pandemic. Moodle LMS enhances the teaching-learning process. Specialized computer laboratory courses are available to upskill students in different disciplines. Differently-abled students benefit from various assistive technologies like Braille Library, Screen Readers, and Voice Recording facilities. Internet access

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and printing equipment are provided for all students, and handson practice is available for computer science and related fields. The institution's extensive use of technology and innovative approaches enriches learning environment, facilitating a comprehensive educational experience.

The Examination process became computerized with hassle-free Online Registration and Fee payment modes. The ERP system facilitates the consolidation of Internal Marks and ensures accurate attendance records. Results are processed and published online and Examination related information is accessible through the Online Examination Portal. To maintain confidentiality, question paper setting and evaluation are done through password-protected CDs. Faculty members are trained to

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use IBOSS Software for examination management. Visually impaired students benefit from Voice Recording Facility instead of scribes. The EMS-Heber Online Exam Portal, HeberOX, was introduced during the COVID-19 pandemic, enabling smooth question paper dissemination and answer script collection with OTP verification. Examination reforms include retakes for missed exams due to various reasons, the use of objective type questions in some courses, consideration of library hours for CIA marks, and an innovative component in CIA for assessing creativity. The Institution is part of the National Academic Depository, facilitating credit transfer through the Academic Bank of Credits. Plagiarism checks are mandatory for PG projects using URKUND. Key aspects of the examination process include question paper setting by external experts, centralized evaluation with internal and external evaluators and a revaluation option for students within 15 days of result publication.

Course Coordinators assess Couse Outcome (CO) attainment levels and prepare action plans to improve performance. The Articulation Matrix analyzes students' overall scores, considering Gap Analysis and Outcome reports. Curriculum updates are based on faculty recommendations and Indirect Assessment Methods. Continuous assessment has allowed the Institution to refine the curriculum, introducing innovative programs/courses based on stakeholder needs. This ensures the institution's offerings align with learning outcomes and workforce requirements, preparing students for successful careers and fostering a lifelong love for learning.

3.1 - Promotion of Research and Facilities

Bishop Heber College emphasizes academic excellence through research, facilitated by the exclusive Deanery for Research and Development. Research Policies encompass promotion, ethics, plagiarism check, and consultancy. Research Committees, such as

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Research Advisory, Plagiarism Standing, and Research Ethics Committees, oversee scholars' activities. The college has 17 recognized Research Departments with 238 Ph.D. scholars under 127 supervisors. Research facilities include a DST-FIST funded Centralized Heber Analytical Instrumentation Facility, wellstocked library, and dedicated computer labs. Faculty and scholars are recognized annually for their research contributions. Institutional incentives and awards support research activities, resulting in substantial output. External agencies grant significant research funds, and consultancy generates revenue. The college boasts 350 publications in indexed journals, 182 articles in Scopus, and 129 in Web of Sciences, among others. It has produced 185 Ph.D. scholars, and students have authored books, contributed to papers, and developed products and apps. The Institutional Scopus h-index is 14, demonstrating the institution's commitment to impactful research. The Research forum 'Synergy' comprising the research scholars of all Departments addresses the issues/concerns experienced by researchers. The institution's impressive publication record, Ph.D. scholars, and students' contributions demonstrate its impact in the academic world.

The 'Academic Audit and Star Department Evaluation' is an integral part of the Perspective Plan Deployment aimed at achieving high-quality benchmarks across various departments of the institution. Conducted annually since 2008 by the IQAC, the audit process focuses on Quality Indicators recommended by NAAC & MHRD-NIRF and department-specific milestones.

To streamline the auditing process, the IQAC has developed the Heber e-Portal Template for AQAR (HePTA), providing a scientific approach to auditing, ensuring accuracy, and efficiency. Internal Evaluators assess the departments, followed by External evaluation by Subject Experts who verify evidence and departmental presentations while maintaining confidentiality.

Scoring is based on different parameters, with a maximum score

of 100 for each department. The Arts Departments' scoring ranges from Five Stars for scores of 60 and above, down to One Star for scores between 20 and 29. Similarly, Science Departments score Five Stars for 70 and above, down to One Star for scores between 30 and 39.

Recognizing the excellence, the management awards cash prizes to departments, with Five Star Departments receiving Rs. 50,000/-, Four Star Departments Rs. 30,000/-, and Three Star Departments Rs. 20,000/-.

The Academic Audit fosters healthy competition among departments, encouraging them to set higher benchmarks for holistic development.

6.4 - Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 - Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

The college places significant emphasis on maintaining financial transparency and accountability through a wellstructured system of internal and external audits. The college employs a full-time Chartered Accountant and an Auditor to handle the accounts on a regular basis, and a statutory auditor conducts an annual review of all financial records. To promote transparency and responsible financial management at the department level, the college conducts an "Administrative Audit" of income and expenditure for each financial year. Each department is required to furnish details of various income and expenditure heads, supported by bills and vouchers, which are then audited by the Internal The college organized a three-day Workshop on Academic and Administrative Audit for its administrative staff, with support from UBCHEA. Moreover, to enhance transparency in financial management, the college's government accounts undergo external audits by officers from the Joint Director of Collegiate Education annually, with an additional review by the Auditor General every five years.

6.4.3 - Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

The Institution's resource mobilization policy aims to provide quality higher education to all students. It operates through two streams: Aided and Self-Financed. The Aided stream, consisting of 17 programs, receives funds from the government and utilizes student fees for running costs and overheads. In the Self-Financed stream with 37 programs, student fees are used for staff salaries, infrastructure, teaching materials, and assessments. Funds are also generated through institutional activities and endowment contributions from retired staff and alumni. The institution has received significant support from various government and international agencies, including the University Grants Commission, Department of Biotechnology, and others. Additionally, the college engages in resourcegenerating activities like renting out halls and guest houses, alumni contributions, sports academies' fees, institutional consultancy, and corporate training. Departments mobilize resources through donations and manage them responsibly with

internal and external audits. Optimum utilization of resources, including financial and infrastructural aspects, is a priority. Regular budget reviews and efficient scheduling of classes ensure maximum utilization of available resources, benefitting over 12,000 students across classrooms, labs, library, and sports facilities.

The IQAC focuses on reviewing Teaching Learning and Assessment Processes, pedagogy, and technology. Two key initiatives are:

OBE-Based Curriculum: All 51 Programs (UG & PG) align with the Institution's Vision and Mission, emphasizing Whole Person Education. The Curriculum is mapped to Bloom's Taxonomy Levels, enabling learners to understand Program Outcomes, Specific Learning Outcomes, etc. Attainment Calculations are done, and an Articulation Matrix identifies gaps. Recommendations and indirect assessment methods are compared, leading to curriculum revisions. Ongoing attainment assessment and new programs/courses are introduced based on requirements. Course Coordinators create Action Plans for each course, strengthening

the Formative Assessment Loop.

Teaching Learning Assessment Enhancement: a) ICT Enabled Teaching-Learning Assessment: IQAC enhances ICT skills of teaching staff through a one-week workshop. Faculty create SLO videos as e-content, integrating ICT tools into their lesson plans. This promotes engaging learning experiences and periodic SLO attainment assessment. b) Institutional Academic Performance Indicator (API): IQAC designed a tool to assess faculty performance across various parameters like teaching competency, research output, additional responsibilities at college and department levels. A scientific scoring procedure facilitates objective interpretation and enables faculty development. These initiatives ensure a learner-centric approach and continuous improvement of teaching, learning, and assessment practices within the institution.

The Centre for Environmental Sustainability is responsible for efficiently managing and converting waste into valuable resources. Through a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Joe Engineering works, the Institution receives assistance in waste management, aiming to transform into a Zero-Waste Institution within two years in the city. In recognition of their zero-waste practices, the Trichy City Corporation awarded the Institution in August 2022. Garden's degradable waste is vermi-composted to enrich the soil, with the compost being sold at ?15 per kilogram, generating ?59,300 in revenue from 2020 to 2022. ● Food waste from Hostels and Canteens is partly donated as fodder for Poultry farms, while the rest is utilized to produce Biogas. • The main waste produced at the Institution is Paper, which is recycled into folders, files, and gift articles at the Paper Recycling Unit established in 2022. • Waste bins are available in classrooms, corridors, canteens, and hostel kitchens, with green-coloured dustbins dedicated to biodegradable waste like food waste and paper. • E-waste production is minimized through careful maintenance efforts such as using quality power cables, stabilizers, and inverters, and the dysfunctional computers are used in a Computer Assembling and Troubleshooting Unit for student learning.
